

## NATIONAL SKIN CENTRE HEALTH FUND Annual Report for FY2025

### PURPOSE

The National Skin Centre Health Fund (NSCHF) was registered as a Charity under the Singapore Charities Act, Chapter 37 on 20 August 2020. The NSCHF was established to receive donations towards the pursuit of medical research and development, improvement to health services in Singapore, and to provide funded care to patients determined to be in need of financial assistance. NSCHF took over the funds and activities from National Skin Center Health Endowment Fund in May 2021. The Fund is an approved Institution of a Public Character (IPC) and is valid until 29 September 2027.

## ROLE OF THE GOVERNING BOARD

The Board's role is to provide strategic direction and oversight of NSCHF's programmes and objectives and to steer the charity towards fulfilling its vision and mission through good governance. As part of its role, the following matters require Board's approval:

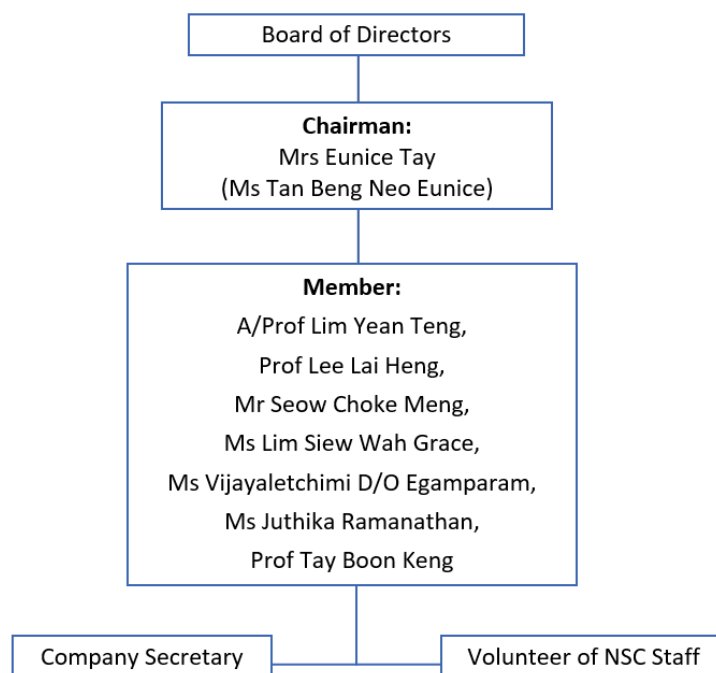
- Approve budget for the financial year and monitor expenditure against budget;
- Review and approve quarterly financial statements;
- Regularly monitor the progress of the charity's programmes.
- Annual review of reserves to ensure that the reserves are adequate and that the charity could fulfil its continuing obligations.
- Decides to place its reserves in fixed deposit or with Fund Managers approved by MOHH as short and long term investments respectively.

## TERM LIMIT OF BOARD

To enable succession planning and steady renewal in the spirit of sustainability of the charity, the Board has a term limit of ten years. We currently do not have board members serving more than 10 consecutive years. Board members are renewed or re-appointed every three years.

## POLICY ON THE MANAGEMENT AND AVOIDANCE OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The Fund does not have paid staff and the Board members do not receive remuneration from the Fund for their services rendered. All activities of the Fund are managed by staff of National Skin Centre (NSC). The Fund Board members comply with the National Healthcare Group policy on conflict of interest.



## **RESERVES POLICY**

The National Skin Centre Health Fund (“NSCHF”) is a registered charity with a mission to give grants, raise and manage financial contributions in support of medical research and developments, medical and healthcare education, and healthcare services related to dermatology and venereology for Singaporeans, and the Singapore community at large.

As NSCHF main source of funding is donations, a reserve policy is required to ensure long term financial stability and sufficient funding to support the charity’s principal activities.

Where possible, NSCHF should aim to have a reserves level of more than or equal to 5 years, to hedge against fluctuations in income and unpredictable emergency situations.

## **CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY**

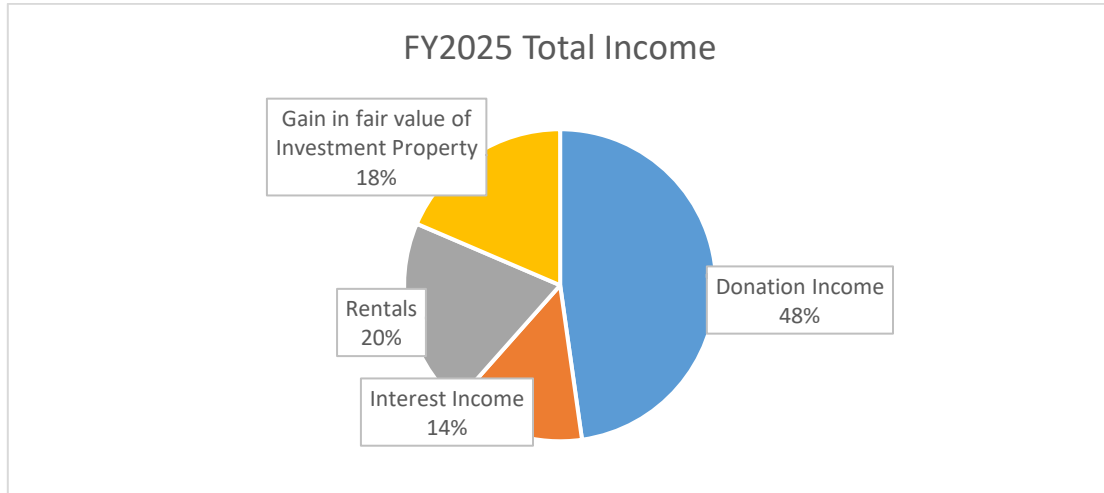
All Board members are required to comply with the charity’s conflict of interest policy. The Board has put in place documented procedures for Board members to declare actual or potential conflicts of interests on a regular and need-to basis. Board members also abstain and do not participate in decision-making on matters where they have a conflict of interest.

## **WHISTLE-BLOWING POLICY**

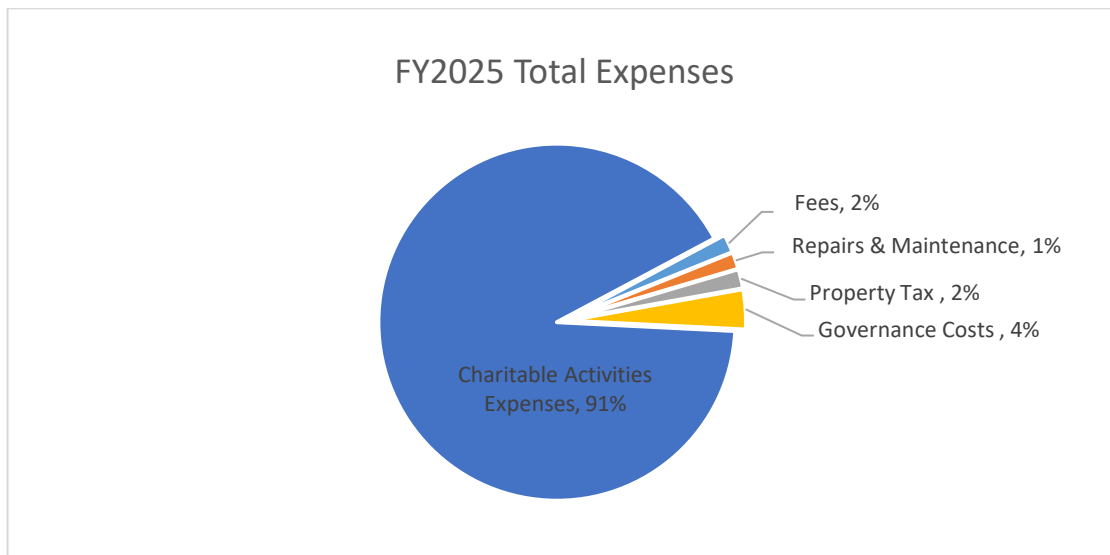
Our charity has in place, a whistle-blowing policy to address concerns about possible wrongdoing or improprieties in financial or other matters within the charity.

## SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The Fund reported a net deficit of \$25,412 for FY2025. Total income and expenses amounted to \$215,606 and \$241,018 respectively. The accumulated fund as at 31 March 2025 amounted to \$3,928,573.



Total income of \$215,606 comprised donations received from companies and individual donors amounting to \$102,967, interest income amounting to \$29,739, rental income amounting to \$42,900 and gain in fair value of investment property amounting to \$40,000.



Total expenses were \$241,018, which included charitable expenses of \$219,603, governance costs of \$8,684 and other operating expenses amounting to \$12,731.

## **CHARITABLE PROGRAMMES AND ACTIVITIES**

The Fund supported the following charitable activities during this year:

### **1. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE SCHEMES**

#### **1.1 Tattoo Removal for Youths-at-Risk**

This fund was set aside to support needy school-going children who are asked by their school to have their tattoo removed or faced expulsion from the school. \$96,300 was disbursed as at 31 March 2026.

During the year under review, 44 more patients were recruited including those from juvenile homes and community partners. A total of 152 patients to date has been recruited under the Programme since funding was approved in July 2018, and 225 treatments have been completed.

#### **1.2 Skin Aid for the Vulnerable and Elderly Programme (SALVE)**

An amount of \$90,000 was approved to support SALVE program. Patients with chronic relapsing skin diseases can be supported clinically and socially with regular application of topical medications, to reduce the incidence of preventable re-admissions into acute care hospitals.

\$16,948 was disbursed as at 31 March 2026, leaving a balance of \$73,052. The monies were claimed for medication and transportation. There are currently no active patients enrolled in the Programme. 4 patients were discharged from the Programme in FY2025 as their conditions have markedly improved.

#### **1.3 Medication Assistance Scheme**

This fund was set up to provide financial assistance to patients who requires expensive non-standard drugs and fall outside the criteria for other funding. There was no disbursement in FY2025. The available funding has been reduced to \$10,000 due to the low disbursement in recent years.

#### **1.4 Health Fund-SEC for Eczema patients**

The Fund provided financial assistance to the needy patients diagnosed with eczema who are prescribed retail items for their treatment that are not supported by Medifund. \$386 was disbursed in FY2025, leaving a balance of \$1,396 as at 31 March 2026.

#### **1.5 Severe Acne Vulgaris Treatment for Youth**

An amount of \$30,000 was approved to support patients suffering from severe acne vulgaris. The team was actively recruiting eligible patients; hence no disbursements were made in FY2025.

#### **1.6 Port-wine Stains Removal**

In November 2024, a sum of \$20,000 was set aside to provide financial assistance to patients with port-wine stains condition who are unable to afford the costly treatment. \$2,123 was disbursed in FY2025.

## **2. COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAMMES**

### **2.1 Suu Balm or equivalent Itch Programme – Donation to NKF**

In view of the success of the pilot programme in 2021, \$80,122 was approved in September 2022 to purchase Suu Balm as a donation in kind for patients undergoing Renal Dialysis at NKF. As at 31 March 2026, a total of \$235,034 was spent on such purchases for the NKF patients. An additional top-up of \$275,521 was approved, leaving a balance of \$120,609.

### **2.2 Badminton Camp for Kids with Eczema**

An amount of \$9,000 was approved to support badminton camps held for children with eczema, with the aim of encouraging active living among children with this skin disease. 4 camps have been held between 2022 and 2023 and a total of \$2,077 was disbursed thus far, leaving a balance of \$6,923.

### **2.3 Patient Welfare Fund (Transportation)**

This fund is set aside to provide financial assistance to the needy patients for transport fares. An additional \$6,000 was approved to support this scheme for another 3 years and a drawdown of \$868 was made during the year.

### **2.4 DermTx @ Home**

An amount of \$17,000 from the Mr Lim Thian Seng Dermatology Research Fund was allocated to a pilot study project. The project aims to enhance patients with limited mobility to continue dermatological nursing treatment at their resident home with the support by community care partner and population health campus. \$12,371 has been utilised, leaving a balance of \$11,294.

## **3. RESEARCH PROJECTS**

In 2023, an amount of \$120,000 was set aside to fund four NSC's Research Projects (\$30,000 each), for a duration of 2 years, with further extension of a year for 2 projects. A total of \$60,610 has been utilised, leaving a balance of \$59,390.

### **3.1 The following studies have been awarded grants from the Mr Lim Thian Seng Dermatology Research Fund:**

- a) Pulsed electromagnetic field therapy in skin wound healing.
- b) Investigating host-microbe interactions in dupilumab-associated head and neck dermatitis.
- c) Advancing the understanding of patient reported outcomes and tailored health message intervention among patients with eczema.
- d) The Role of the Gut Microbiome in Immunotherapy Outcomes for Alopecia Areata.

## **FUTURE PLANS AND COMMITMENTS**

### **Existing Programmes**

NSCHF will continue to support the existing programmes initiated in FY2025.
